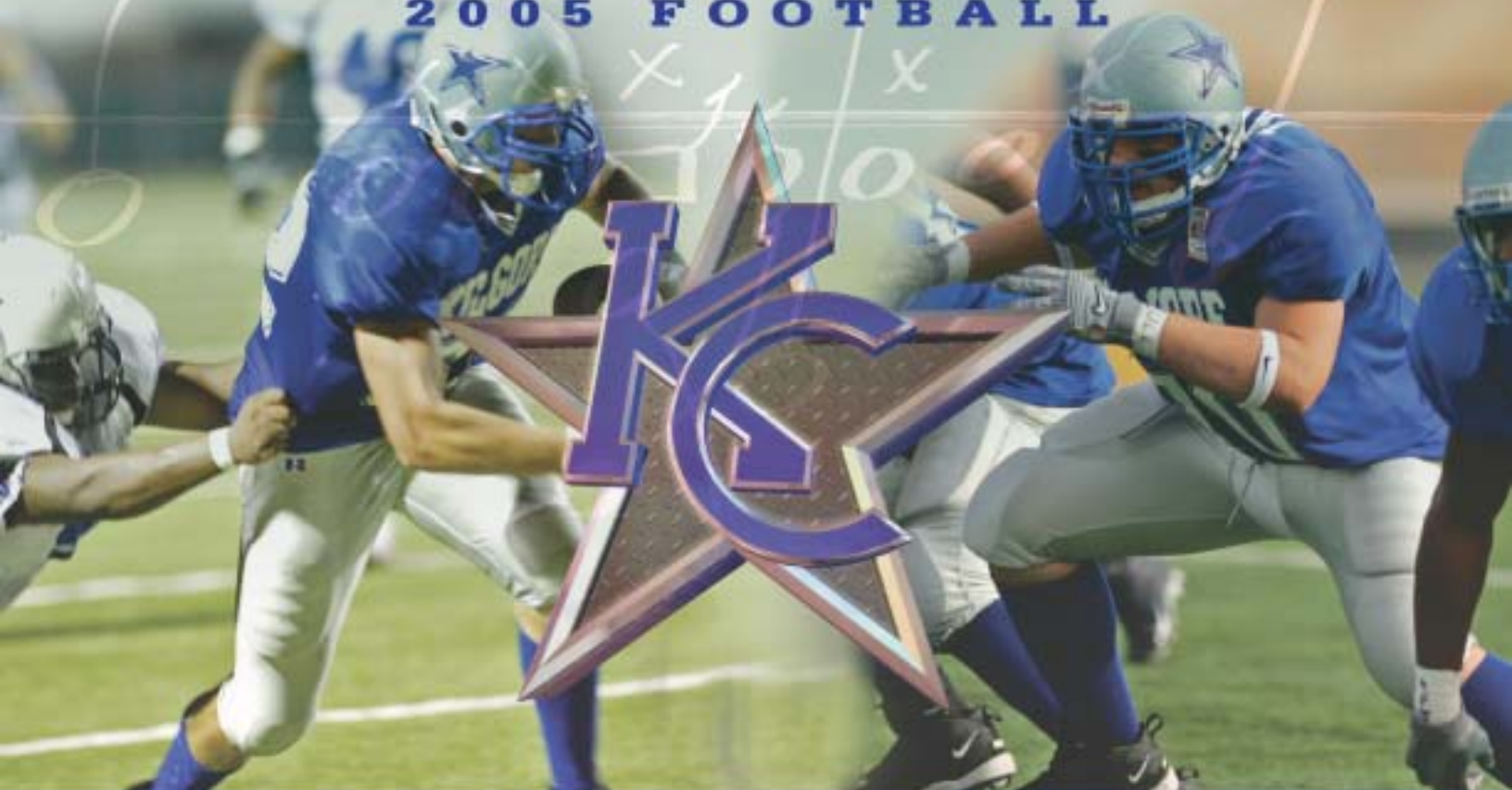

SEASON OUTLOOK

Kilgore College head coach Jimmy Rieves will begin the 2005 season a marked man – and he wouldn't have it any other way.

Guiding the Rangers to the 2004 Southwest Junior College Football Conference championship, the school's second in four years, Rieves and his staff have once again become the measuring stick to which Kilgore College Football has grown accustomed. Over the past 70 years, the Rangers have carved their niche into the Texas football annals, becoming the state's winningest junior college program with 426 victories.

But KC coaches and players alike know that upholding the program's winning tradition won't be achieved without hard work, and with the changes facing this year's Rangers there's no room for complacency.

The biggest offensive challenge facing 2005's team won't be from departures on the field. Instead, most changes will come from the coaching ranks.

For a squad returning eight starters, KC has three new offensive coaches, including first-year coordinator Travis Fox, who is in his fifth season on the KC coaching staff.

Defensively, the Rangers have their work cut out for them. KC returns only three starters from a squad that ranked second in the SWJCFC in total defense, yielding only 263 yards per game. The incoming freshman class is projected to contribute early.

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACK

Along with the new coaches comes a new quarterback. Sophomores Steven Prince (Longview/Spring Hill) and Clint Toon (Kilgore/Kilgore) will enter two-a-days battling for the responsibility of executing Fox's plays from the field. Both had good spring workouts and played sparingly last season with Prince throwing for two touchdowns in a week-six conference-victory over Tyler Junior College.

RUNNING BACK

The backfield is solid as the sophomore duo of running back Eric Hatchett (Willis/Willis) and fullback Darryl Citizen (Houston/Aldine Eisenhower) return from KC's successes of a season ago. Hatchett was the Ranger workhorse, rushing for 707 yards and a 5.7 yards-per-carry average with Citizen clearing his lanes.

RECEIVER

Returning only two experienced players, KC's receiving corps is a young group with room for growth. Sophomores Guy Clayton (Kilgore/Kilgore), Justin Huff (Willis/Willis), Chris Jackson (Lawton, Okla./Lawton), Xavier Randall (Italy/Italy) and Doug Scott (Laird Hill/Laird Hill) will compete for the starting roles along with redshirt freshman Lewis Milbry (Arlington/Arlington).

OFFENSIVE LINE

The offensive line returns a wealth of experience, with six players filling starting roles at some point in 2004. Sophomores Mike Jones (Houston/Chavez), Ian Johnson (Lufkin/Lufkin), Nick Najarro (Forney/Forney), Clayton Norman (Garrison/Garrison), Ricky Rudolph (Tom Bean/Tom Bean) and Nick Willson (Douglassville/Atlanta) logged significant playing time over the course of last season with much of the group filling in at two positions. Corey Hammons (Corpus Christi/Clear Brook), Brandon Hurd (Fort Worth/Dunbar) and Jacob Issacks (Arp/Arp), all sophomores, are projected to fill in as well.

TIGHT END

"As good a group as I've had here." That's how Rieves describes the deepest position on the team. Redshirt sophomore Brian Carlson (Spring/Klein Oak) returns and brings with him the heroics of his 18-yard touchdown catch and run against conference foe Blinn College in week three. Athletic sophomore and part-time starter Marc Jones (Norfolk, Va./Lake Taylor) is also back. KC plans to capitalize on the knowledge, experience and skills these two veterans bring to the field.

DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE

One starter returns in the form of defensive tackle Torrin Bush (Hallsville/Hallsville). After a productive freshman season, the sophomore will anchor the interior line alongside fellow sophomore C.J. DeVault (Mexia/Teague), freshman William Luke (Houston/Sterling) and newcomer Marcus Smith (Conroe/Oak Ridge). Sophomore defensive ends Byron McCollister (Dallas/Wilmer Hutchins) and Jason Miller (Tyler/Lee) will also receive significant playing time.

LINEBACKER

Curtis Straughter (Spring/Spring) is the lone holdout from 2004. Straughter is expected to help lead newcomer Tyson Kirksey (Chireno/Lufkin). Frank Brown (Garland/Garland), a sophomore with limited time last season, should make hefty contributions as well.

DEFENSIVE BACK

The secondary also brings back one starter, sophomore Ronnie Powell (Denison/Denison). This spring Powell moved from cornerback, where he ranked second in the SWJCFC with six interceptions, to safety alongside sophomore Keaton Daniels (Longview/Longview), who recorded several snaps in 2004. Ja'mond Hawkins (Tyler/Chapel Hill), Greg Payne (Lufkin/Lufkin) and Quintin Wilson (Arlington/Arlington) will rotate in at cornerback.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Michael Cohen (Houston/Cypress Falls) returns for his sophomore season after a freshman campaign in which he averaged 40.1 yards per punt with a long of 59. Sophomore Ben Magouryk (Jacksonville/Jacksonville) will again handle kickoff and PAT duties after a solid freshman campaign.



COACHING STAFF

Jimmy Rieves enters his sixth season as head coach and defensive coordinator at Kilgore College. He ranks fourth all-time among KC coaches with a .741 winning percentage, compiling a 40-14 overall record.

Rieves is assisted by first-year offensive coordinator Travis Fox, who is in his fifth season at the school. Gary Manuel and Daniel Chappell join Fox on the offensive side of the ball, both in their first season overall at KC.

Defensively, the tenured Don Yancy, second-year man James Holcombe and newcomer Norris McCleary will be dug into the trenches.

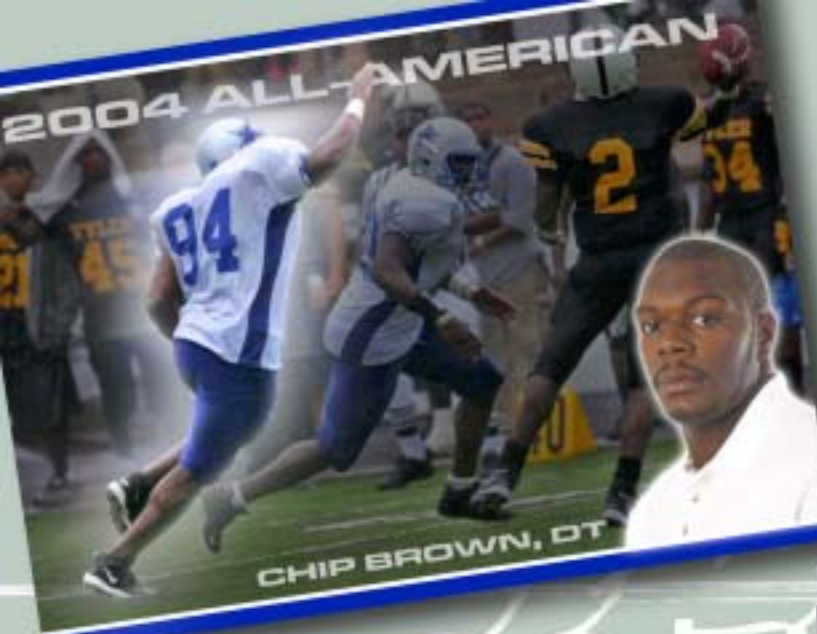
